Cynthia Arkin - an Appreciation

April 30th marked the end of Cynthia Arkin's second and last term as President of the Plastic Club. Much was accomplished during these four years. They were marked by membership growth, infrastructure improvement, and program development. First of all, Cynthia was fortunate to have a large bequest from William H. Campbell and another larger bequest from Jeanne Coryell come to the Club while in office. This enabled her to make significant improvements to the Shiekman Studio by installing a new ceiling and lighting. She had new front window shutters made and pointed the bricks, and painted the front and back of the building. She added a new "brick nook" in the garden. And, she had the kitchen completely renovated. She brought back the "Rabbit", the themed costume party that had been dormant for fifty years. During her Presidency, membership topped 200 and 10 workshops were meeting every week. Salons and concerts were funded and a new movie screen, skylight shade, and sound equipment were provided for the monthly free movie programs. She also inaugurated an annual "appreciation dinner" for the people who volunteer their time to make the club function. Cynthia is also our web master and general helper in all things to do with the Plastic Club. As a "retirement" gift, she was presented with a little dogwood tree for the garden that she spends many hours tending. But, she isn't retiring!!! She will remain on the Board of Directors as Vice-President and will continue to work to keep the Plastic Club the great place that it is. Thank you, Cynthia!

FIBER AND TEXTILES

We hadn't had a show about Fibers and Textiles in a while. So we had one in April, we did. Fifty-two examples of works using fibers, cloth, textiles, lace, stitchery, embroidery, and other mixed uses of material were on view. The juror of this show, **Daryl Lancaster**, picked **Karl Richard Olsen's** manipulation of cloth on an armature entitled "*Heartless Coward*" for First Prize. Second Prize went to **Marie Huard** for her printed fabric piece entitled "*The Flowering of Mary.*" Third Prize was awarded to **Sally Poulshock** for her lovely, large hand-pieced quilt that took up the entire wall behind the couch. Other awards went to **Jane J. Wilkie, Ellen Grenell, Bonnie MacAllister, Alyse C. Bernstein, and Laura Friesel**. In a few years we'll have another Fiber and Textiles themed show.

104th Members' Medal Show

Of all the exhibitions that the Plastic Club mounts every year, the Members' Medal Show is the most important. This isn't just because it is our oldest continuous show (104 years.) It's also the show in which most of our members participate because there is no theme or medium requirements to hinder them from entering their work. 109 members participated in the show this year. The juror, **Christopher Schmidt**, partner in the Schmidt-Dean Galley, chose **Jessica Barber's** mixed media print, "*Collaboration*" for the Gold Medal. **Robert Yong Lee** received the Silver Medal for his cyanotype, "*Avocado.*" Other prize winners were **Carol Tashjian, Carla Liguori, Idaherma Williams, Bonnie MacAllister, Charles Lenzi, Gail Zelikovsky, Ron Ploeg, Lorie Balistocky, and Tom McGinley**.
